As a general surgeon, Dr. Chung will be performing all aspects of general surgery.


"As I was nearing the end of my surgical training, I realized that I really enjoyed all aspects of surgery, and that I truly wanted to have a general practice," explained Dr. Chung. "In the larger cities, you are often forced, unfortunately, to specialize your practice because there are so many specialists. I ultimately narrowed my choices down to three and decided to interview at Gibson Area Hospital first because it was close to Chicago where I have family. After visiting Gibson City, I canceled my other interviews. Everyone I met in town was warm and friendly, and the physicians who I met were the type of people who seemed to share my values."

Dr. Chung completed his general surgery residency at the University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics. In the Clinical Investigation Certificate Program, he received the NIH K30 Clinical Research Curriculum Award, funded by Iowa Scholars. He received his Medical Degree from University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine and received his bachelor's degree in economics from the University of California Irvine.

While growing up and going through school, Dr. Chung had always known that he wanted to dedicate his life helping others.

"Helping others had been instilled in me from my childhood by my parents, who had me working at hospitals and soup kitchens, passing out sandwiches to the homeless on the beaches of San Diego, and doing other volunteer work from a very young age," said Dr. Chung. "As I grew older and went to college, I started watching the TV show ER. I fell in love with the show because the doctors and nurses were all hardworking, compassionate people, doing exciting work that was really helping the most in need--the sick. After the first season in 1994-1995, I knew I had to become a doctor. As for becoming a surgeon, I chose general surgery because I figured that if you could only choose one doctor to have with you, a general surgeon would be the most versatile."

Dr. Chung's patient philosophy is to provide excellent, evidencebased, and compassionate surgical care.



He added, "I want all of my patients to feel like I'm treating them with the same dedication and attention to detail as I would if they were a part of my own immediate family."

Dr. Chung plans to buy a house in Gibson City that is walking distance from the hospital and his office. His longterm plan is to get to the point of being able to devote time every year to overseas volunteer work.

"I was very fortunate to spend a month operating in Zambia during my residency with one of my professors and mentors who, without exception, spends one month per year in India, China, or Africa. It was a life changing experience," explained Dr. Chung.

He is a member of the American Medical Association and the American College of Surgeons.

While Dr. Chung was in college, he was a devoted reader. He hasn't had much time to read recently, but plans on starting to read again.

"I also really enjoy watching movies and listening to music," said Dr. Chung. "Besides that, I have a very close knit family and I spend a lot of my time with them. Any spare time I have after that, I'm planning on devoting it to becoming a Fighting Illini fan. I've already starting buying things in Illini colors."

Cristina Medrano, M.D. making a difference in El Salvador

General Surgeon Dr. Cristina Medrano traveled to El Salvador July 3 – 11 to provide medical services to five mountain villages.

"To get to the villages, we would hike through the mountain trails while horses would carry the supplies," explained Medrano. "I was "zip-lined" across a river to get to a village. During the dry season we would have been able to wade across."

Villagers would walk with them from one community to the next.

"We would have men and women in their 70s and 80s hiking and climbing with us, not even breaking a sweat!" Medrano said." On one of the longer treks, I was told children as "old" as 8 years might make the 2 hour hike in the mountain trails from one community to the next. I thought about how I have a hard time letting my 8 year old walk down to the park that's half a block from our house!"

Each year the group brings some of the same basic medications like over the counter pain medications, prenatal vitamins, children's vitamins and antibiotics.

"This was the first year a general surgeon went, and I was able to do some minor procedures," explained Medrano. "I was able to repair a machete wound on a farmer's hand. In another village, another medical volunteer and I "rounded" on an 80-year-old man who had a prostatectomy in the city about 2-3 weeks prior. A message got to us that his family was worried about his incision and that he possibly needed a drain removed. He had an infected drain site, was having chills and wasn't eating well. I wondered how he got up

the mountain to his home at his age and in his

condition!"

Medrano traveled with a group from Champaign who has made this trip many times.

"Father Tom Royer and Kathy Fries from the Church of St. Mary in Champaign have organized 1, sometimes 2 trips a year for the past 20 years," said Medrano. Their interest in the early years was inspired by the humanitarian work of the Catholic church in the region. When the group started going in the 1980s, the Salvadoran government was fighting a civil war against the "guerrillas". They have sent delegations since then, through the military conflict, the Peace Accord in the early 1990s.

Gibson Area Hospital & Health Services (GAHHS) has earned a reputation of making available the latest technology to its patients. This is further solidified by the organization's latest addition to the radiology department.

GAH now offers stateof-the-art GE scanning equipment that boasts Adaptive Statistical Interactive Reconstruction (ASIR). ASIR is a new advanced reconstruction technique that reduces image noise and improves low contrast detectability and image quality.

the hospital for a CT scan will benefit greatly. The new

scanning equipment allows the hospital to expose patients to up to 50% less

radiation than a traditional scan and all the while not sacrifice image quality." At present, GAH is one of only a couple facilities to offer this new technology.

"This is very exciting to be able to make this available to our patients," says Lozier." It is obviously the ideal situation whenever you can both maximize patient safety and deliver clearer test results. This certainly accomplishes that. Historically, the more radiation used in a CT Scan translated into a sharper and clearer image. At GAHHS, this will no longer be the case. This is especially relevant for children who are more prone to harm

from overexposure of radiation."

New Online Medical Imaging

In addition to the new CT Scanner, Gibson Area Hospital & Health Services (GAHHS) Radiology Department now has a new Picture Archiving Communication Systems (PACS). PACS is a system that is dedicated to the storage, retrieval, distribution and presentation of medical images for radiologists and physicians.

PACS handles images from a variety of modalities, including Ultrasound, CT, MRI, X-Rays, and Nuclear Medicine. These images are stored on the PACS and are made accessible on the Internet through a secure Web server that is maintained by the GAHHS Information Technology Department.

The new GE Centricity PACS IW offers many benefits compared to the former PACS allowing:

• Images to be transmitted to any PACS system that the hospital would want to connect to.

- All images will be immediately available, no archiving.
- Each user to have Web access that is the same no matter where he logs in.
- Radiologist peer review with other radiologists across the country.
- Easier and more accurate reporting of discrepancies, critical results, and vital images.
- Technologists to have more options when preparing exams for reading.
- More patient information to be stored.
- For communication between users accessing a patient's file.

Emergency Nursing is a specialty in which nurses care for patients in the emergency or critical phase of their illness or injury and are adept at:

- · discerning life-threatening problems.
- · prioritizing the urgency of care.
- rapidly and effectively carrying out life supportive measures and other treatments.
- · acting with a high degree of independence and ability to initiate needed measures without outside direction.
- educating the patient and his family with the information and emotional support needed to preserve themselves as they cope with the situation that has presented them to the **Emergency Department.**

These activities may be carried out in a variety of settings and not necessarily in an "Emergency Room."

Rose said, "It is really an honor to work with such a great group of nurses who are dedicated to their profession."

This competency of the GAHHS nurses is reflected in the Arbor and Associates and HCHAPS patient satisfaction scores. The Illinois average overall score is 63% and the National U.S. average is 66%.

Gibson Area Hospital is overall 83%.

"This distinction is another example of how GAHHS continues to support the hospital's overall mission - to be the 'model of excellence in rural healthcare'," said Rose.



Annex Resident Dorothy Birkey

At 92, Annex (GAHHS Long-Term Care) resident Dorothy Birkey is still full of energy and has a passion to help make Gibson Area Hospital and the Annex a better place.

Dorothy graduated from Fisher High School in 1937 and married the man of her dreams, Earl, in September 1937.

"I helped my husband," explained Dorothy. "I followed my wedding vows to take Earl for richer or poorer, better or worse, until death we part. We worked together."

Dorothy always wanted to be a nurse, but her Mom said that they couldn't afford another nurse in the family since her two sisters were already nurses.

In 1952, one well-know area resident, Mr. D.K. Roth, had a dream to make Gibson Community Hospital a reality and the hospital was built.

Soon after, Dorothy was one of the first volunteers at the hospital and then was asked to work for the hospital. "I was hired as one of

the first nurse's aides. I was responsible for giving people baths and taking care of the patients," said Dorothy.

"I made 85 cents per hour," explained Dorothy. "I was a nurse's aide for many years. I had love in my heart for people and being a nurse's aide was perfect."

Dorothy was able to take a test in Chicago to become a Licensed Practical Nurse (LPN).

"I enjoyed my work a lot," Dorothy said. "One day I had to have five patients bathed by noon. I told the doctor that I had too much to do and the doctor said 'Dorothy, take one at a time'."

"I wore my nurse's hat with pride and I still have it," said Dorothy.

"Later, my sister said I could further my education by passing a test for Medicare," said Dorothy. "I passed the test. I learned that I knew more than I thought."

She decided to work at another nursing home before returning back to Gibson Hospital. The hospital wanted her to do administration work, but she had to help her husband. She enjoyed being busy with church activities and sewing and wanted to continue to be busy.

"My husband and I went to Florida during the winter," said Dorothy. "I wanted to continue to be busy, so I took a job at Burger King."

"I came back to work at GAH's New Long-Term Care Unit (Annex),"

Dorothy said. "I loved my patients and loved my work. I was very cautious of the patients' families and was nice to them all."

"My nursing work philosophy has always been the same - be compassionate, do what you have to do, never lie, always come to work with a smile, and be happy with your work," she said.

Dorothy retired from the Annex in 1995.

"My mind is always with the hospital," she said.

"I'm a Christian and every day I ask God for guidance and that His light shines on me," she said. "I've been busy in my life and I never left any grass growing under my feet."

Dorothy added, "Dr. Nelson has always taken good care of me. I can tell him what is going on and he listens."

To this day, Dorothy is still busy while at the Annex. Daily, she makes her rounds at the Annex to visit with residents and see how they are. She greets new families and residents and makes sure they are taken care of.

She and Earl were married 58 years, 8 months and 8 days, had three sons, five grandchildren and many greatgrandchildren.


Welcome Radiologist Ishwar Jagasia, M.D.
